We are grateful to present the honourable Eric Robinson to speak to staff and families. Mr. Robinson is member of Pimicikamak Cree Nation and residential school survivor. He has worked with numerous Indigenous organizations, in broadcasting and served as an MLA and cabinet minister in the Manitoba legislature. Mr. Robinson will speak with staff about Truth and Reconciliation followed by time for questions and discussion. A light lunch will served afterwards.

Staff are encouraged to reflect on their personal commitments to Truth and Reconciliation, and to record their commitment on a (paper) orange shirt. Stations will be set up at SSCY Centre for staff to record and post their commitments to action. We hope to revisit and refresh these commitments in the coming years as we work together to advance Truth and Reconciliation within our Centre. SSCY staff can review their email for resources and examples of commitments made by colleagues.

There will also be children's book readings about Orange Shirt Day and Truth and Reconciliation, read by Stefanie Wiens and Allison Hasselfield. These readings will be shared on RCC social media.

SSCY Centre will be closed for the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on September 30th.









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
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Sundance 2022

Honouring Jordan: Why we don't say "JP"

Jordan River Anderson's birthday is October 22nd. He would have been 23 this year.

As you may know, Jordan's Principle was established as a result of Jordan River Anderson's experience as a First Nations child trying to access healthcare in the early 2000s. Jordan was a child with complex needs who passed away in hospital at the age of 5. He was unable to return home due to federal and provincial jurisdictional disputes related to who would fund the homecare he needed. Jordan's Principle was created to address inequalities in health, social and educational access for First Nations children.

Out of respect for Jordan, his family, and the *principle* of equitable healthcare, it is important to say and write "Jordan's Principle" every time, and to never shorten it to "JP".

We will be holding a small celebration at SSCY in honour of Jordan's birthday - stay tuned for details!
