## Finding Inspiration: Inspired By Wonder's Land Acknowledgement Process

As a childcare provider of multiple sites, during our Nations' Truth and Reconciliation process our organization wanted to learn more about land acknowledgments and how creating our own contributes to the 94 Calls to Action.

We formed a small committee of educators who collaborated to create our own personal land acknowledgement. Through this process we researched the land that we reside on and attended workshops including "How to write a land acknowledgment" by Elder Mary Wilson and Grandmother Helen Settee. We also contacted Joanna White, Cultural and Curriculum advisor with RRC Polytech, who offered us her guidance and wisdom during the creation of our land acknowledgment. After we devised our first draft, we presented it to our Board of Directors and fellow educators for their feedback and approval.

We learned how this process strengthened our culture within the program. We began to think deeply about our relationship with our land and how we value and honor it each day and the "heart work" it took to create it with competing truths. Our children and youngest citizens lead us to new discoveries of who we are as an organization and how our painful history defines who we are today and into the future. The children's contributions of gratitude towards our outdoor

spaces led us to think more deeply about stewardship and sustainability practices. We are learning how most of us are "uninvited guests" of this land and we have the responsibility to it and to pay tribute to its original custodians.

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#### Jordan's Principle Clinician Honoured with Star Blanket

On October 12, 2022, Shiri Berkowitz, a physiotherapist with Jordan's Principle was presented with a Star Blanket from the students and staff at Opaskwayak Educational Authority for her contributions towards the development of the Kakinaw Mêtawêwak (Everyone is Playing) Inclusive Play Structure in the community.



Our vision for this play structure began in December 2020, when Shiri and staff in Jordan's Principle on Opaskwayak Cree Nation had a discussion about the difficulties in finding treatment spaces for Physiotherapy.

They envisioned a culturally appropriate environment for families and a fun and exciting space for children while still providing adequate opportunities for movement and therapy to take place.

Over nearly 2 years we worked with many organizations both within and outside of the community to gain funding, resources and ultimately get the project built. This past summer we were able to see all of our efforts and dreams fulfilled as the Play Structure opened and we watched children, youth, caregivers and even Elders play and enjoy themselves, together.

Although the weather was cool outside, the lodge was hot with the heat from the 48 grandfather rocks which were carefully prepared by the firekeepers over the morning. Cecil shared teachings about the lodge and songs of healing with the group. Stephanie van Haute also supported our learning with guidance and songs.
